

## PARTNERS IN Action >>>

The foundation of our work is our community-based, impact-oriented (CBIO) methodology, which focuses on building relationships and partnering with underserved communities to make measurable and sustainable improvements to the health and well-being of community members. This approach focuses on working through the local community-based organizations best positioned to serve these communities.

Curamericas Global's approach to sustainable change wouldn't be possible without these in-country health professionals, healthcare leaders, nonprofit and governmental organizations. These partnerships and allies are at the center of Curamericas Global's mission to save lives and transform communities around the world.

Here are the organizations that embodied Curamericas Global's mission of health and hope:

#### >> Kenya Ministry of Health KIKOP Project

Curamericas Global has partnered with the Kenya Ministry of Health since 2017. With the support of donors like Ronald McDonald House Charities (RMHC), Curamericas Global has reduced the number of moms and babies dying from preventable and treatable causes in Kisii County, Kenya. Recently, the Ministry of Health and Curamericas served a population of 35,960.

Utilizing its Community Birthing Center (CBC) Manual and its Rapid CBC Assessment Tool, Curamericas Global partnered with communities and the government to:

- Adapt three clinics to the CBC model.
- Add nursing staff to enable 24/7 services.
- Create woman-friendly birthing spaces to the communities' specifications.
- Install battery-backed solar panels to ensure 24/7 electricity.

Curamericas Global also mobilized local communities to deploy health committees, community health volunteers, and mother peer educators that brought health education to every doorstep. These efforts resulted in maternal mortality going from 9 deaths a year to 0 deaths. Neonatal mortality declined 42%.





In addition, through its innovative sexual and reproductive health curriculum, Curamericas Global reached 470 young adolescents. The government is now sustaining the Community Birthing Centers, and the life-saving work continues.

#### Andean Rural Health Care, or Consejo de Salud Rural Andino (CSRA)

For three decades, our Bolivian partner, Consejo de Salud Rural Andino (CSRA) has successfully addressed the causes of maternal and childhood illness and mortality in Bolivia through interventions including immunizations, diarrhea and pneumonia case management, nutrition, maternal and newborn care, and family planning.

#### >> Duke University School of Nursing

Since the partnership between Duke **University School of Nursing and** Curamericas Global began in 2013, more than 70 nursing students have volunteered, learning, and growing professionally at various Guatemalan project sites through the **Nursing Students Without Borders student** club. This collaboration has brought tremendous benefits for student volunteers, including immersion in the local culture and opportunities to practice their clinical skills. In addition, a new clinical immersion program allows students to complete their 56 required clinical hours as part of a required community and public health course.

## >>> Government of Guatemala in Raleigh, N.C.

Since 2017, Curamericas Global has partnered with the Guatemalan Consulate in Raleigh, NC, with the goal of reducing the inappropriate use of the emergency department and to increase preventive care

by educating Guatemalan immigrants in the Carolinas about how to access primary health care providers and empowering them to take control of their health. Since 2017, we've provided one-on-one consultations to over 300 individuals who otherwise have no access to healthcare.

This approach is exemplified through a phone campaign that Curamericas Global helped execute just as the pandemic started.

Spanish-speaking volunteers were on the phones alongside staff of the Guatamalan Consulate, reaching out to more than 15,000 families across the East Coast in need of extra support during this pandemic. Many of these families do not speak English. The volunteers provided evidence-based information about the virus, connected them to vital resources, and served as an ally and friend to those who may not know what to do if they get sick.

More than 500 volunteers donated their time and talents.

#### >> Haiti Outreach Ministries

For nearly 30 years, Haiti Outreach Ministries (HOM) has been supporting families in Port-au-Prince, Haiti through ministry, medical care, schools, an orphanage, and humanitarian aid. What began as an opportunity for Curamericas Global to bring volunteer medical teams to Haiti transformed into a long-term partnership to address the most pressing needs of mothers and children.

Over the next 5 years, Curamericas Global will partner with HOM to build a community health program that will serve over 800 families with young children. Leveraging Curamericas Global's expertise and HOM's reputation in the community, this intervention will:

 Educate mothers on the prevention of disease using simple, home-based practices. "What stood out for us about Curamericas Global was the community-based approach. They are not just handing overused equipment that ultimately ends up sitting in a room somewhere or throwing money at a problem and walking away. They are going into communities and working with local people to really build up a healthy community there, helping them be sustainable until they can do everything independently. That is different and impactful as opposed to other approaches to closing the health care gap."

- Promote health-seeking behavior for common conditions and diseases.
- Empower communities to take ownership of their own health through proactive health outreach and the formation of health committees.

The first few months of the project have focused on building a strong foundation for the program. We hired and trained staff to lead the project in launching Curamericas Global's census-based, impact-oriented methodology, which will assess the most commonly found causes of unnecessary suffering, sickness, and death within the urban area.

Building off the trust HOM has with the community, Curamericas Global will add capacity to HOM by creating sustainable systems that will promote health from generation to generation. From reducing maternal and child mortality to decreasing child malnutrition, the project will encourage healthy behaviors and bring hope to many Haitians living in poverty.

#### >> Young Professionals Board

The Young Professionals Board (YPB) was established in 2020 with the primary purpose of creating awareness and a profound understanding of Curamericas Global within younger generations - an untapped demographic for the organization - in North Carolina and across the U.S.

This group of passionate and driven young adults from Florida, New York and other states have created social networks within their own communities that are now aware of Curamericas Global.

There are two areas where this group is making an impact:

- Increasing awareness and raising funds for Curamericas Global. They recently raised \$8,000, which was enough to provide access to health services to 300 mothers and their families.
- 2. Adding capacity to in-country teams by helping with data analysis.

As the YPB continues to advocate for Curamericas Global, they ensure that Curamericas Global's legacy and mission is passed on and instilled to others for many years to come.

## CURAMERICAS GOLBAL Leads the Response TO COVID-19

When COVID-19 erupted in March 2020, Curamericas Global quickly turned to its trusted partners around the world and in North Carolina to assess the needs of the communities they served. Because of Curamericas Global's previous experience with the Ebola epidemic in Liberia, the organization understood what needed to be done: become an ally and trusted partner that listened and acted on what the community needed most, and develop networks of Community Health Workers who could serve as trusted liaisons to ensure health priorities were being addressed within the community.

#### **Global Response and Impact**

Kisii County, Kenya

Curamericas Global KIKOP project quickly mobilized in the community, training families in the importance of social distancing, washing hands and wearing masks. The communities also sewed more

than 2,000 masks to provide to all project staff and community mothers - a testimony to the community initiative and empowerment Curamericas Global cultivates.

In addition to addressing the health concerns that the coronavirus posed to the communities, Community Health Workers were also charged with dispelling myths and rumors about the virus. These misconceptions included the belief that alcohol, fruits, teas and high or low

temperatures could kill or cure the virus or that animals and insects could transmit it.

As the pandemic continued, our focus on data helped us to know that only 10% of homes actually had hand washing stations. To help alleviate this gap, KIKOP conducted home visits to specifically determine which homes had hand washing stations. If a home did not have access to hand washing, Community Health Workers worked with the family to help construct a station and ensure they had access to water and soap.

Recognizing how vital hand washing was to combatting the coronavirus, Community Health Workers taught local mothers how to build stations from local materials and how to make soap.









Through these efforts, and in partnership with the Kisii County Ministry of Health, we served 35,960 community members in the midst of a pandemic.

Barbara Muffoletto, Curamericas Global's Program Manager and Co-Chair of the CORE Working Group on COVID, led a team of global community health professionals to develop a set of guidelines for home-based care in COVID-19. The guide has been translated into Spanish, French, Khmer (Cambodia), Arabic, Portuguese and Russian. The materials have also been shared with international NGOs, including the more than 192 International Federation of Red Cross/Red Crescents national offices and distributed to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in Africa and the Ministries of Health in Kenya and Rwanda.




## Curamericas Global's Impact in the Carolinas:

## **VOLUNTEER PHONE CALL CAMPAIGN**

As Curamericas Global responded to the needs of its project sites around the world, the organization also realized there were forgotten communities in its own backyard of Raleigh, N.C. that were being left behind when it came to pandemic response tactics. Thanks to the partnership with the Guatemalan Consulate in Raleigh, Curamericas Global pivoted its Window to Health program to go virtual.

The vulnerability of the Hispanic community was evident, as 45% of COVID cases in North Carolina occured in this population, and the communication being shared by the government and healthcare system was mainly in English. In a matter of days, Curamericas Global built an online platform that allowed us to tap into the Consulate's network of people



and begin reaching out to families in Spanish with a simple phone call. Each week, a group of volunteers were calling men and women across North Carolina and up and down the East Coast, to explain what the coronavirus was, how they could protect their families and, most of all, that they were not alone.

Volunteers were often met with responses of disbelief. No one had explained what it meant to social distance or that they shouldn't go to work if they had contracted the virus. Volunteers were not only able to share the vital information, but they also connected them to important resources, like food pantries, unemployment offices and healthcare facilities.

By the end of 2020, Curamericas Global had mobilized 500+ volunteers, reaching more than 10,000 people.

### Curamericas Global Partners with the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services

While the pandemic was affecting all communities across North Carolina, they weren't all being affected equally. Communities that had been historically marginalized by institutions were experiencing far greater challenges. The state and national health systems mobilized resources, but their efforts fell short and leaders knew they needed a community-based approach.

Near the beginning of the pandemic the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services awarded an \$11.4M contract with Curamericas Global that utilized the nonprofit's community-based methodology to reach the state's forgotten communities. Curamericas Global was charged with building an innovative new model for delivering community care by acting as a bridge between the state's healthcare system and local nonprofits.



The goal was to reach 31,500 people living in underserved communities. By the end of the contract, the combined efforts of Curamericas Global and our partners resulted in 163,310 people receiving services and education about COVID-19 and vaccines.

"We are honored that the state entrusts our organization with the responsibility of executing this community health model to reach North Carolina's forgotten families who have fallen outside of the health system," said Andrew Herrera, Executive Director of Curamericas Global.

Curamericas' work consisted of collaborating and supporting Community Health Workers within local nonprofit organizations, training them to identify and connect underserved families with vital resources, including food, COVID-19 testing sites, unemployment offices, transportation resources, and more. Community Health Workers were the hearts and hands of this program.



## Kenya



Community Health Workers trek up and down muddy paths and roads to provide door-to-door health and COVID-19 educations to families in 39 rural communities.

## International PROJECT SITES

The End of the Grant:
The Beginning of Sustainable Change



2020 marked the culmination of a 10-year RMHC grant that helped improve the health of mothers and children in rural Guatemala and Kenya.

Since the relationship with RMHC started in 2010, their grants have helped develop Community Birthing Centers, or "Casa Maternas" in Guatemala, serving a population of 55,637 (spread across five municipalities in two departments). Between 2017 and 2020, the seven "Casa Maternas" attended to 1,233 deliveries, including 332 potentially fatal obstetric complications. As a result, maternal mortality decreased by 79%, and neonatal mortality declined 36%.

**In Kenya**, Curamericas Global partnered with the communities and the Ministry of Health KIKOP Project to adapt underutilized clinics to the CBC model, successfully serving 35,960 people.

Improvements to the clinics included adding nursing staff to enable 24/7 services, creating woman-friendly birthing spaces to the communities' specifications, and installing battery-backed solar panels to ensure 24/7 electricity.

In addition to building the CBC model, Cuarmericas Global and its Kenya and Guatemala partners also implemented an innovative sex-ed curriculum that reached 2,253 adolescents in local schools. Globally, pregnancy and childbirth are the leading cause of death among girls aged 15-19 years. Education on sexual and reproductive health in schools is often nonexistent. Our curriculum goes beyond traditional "sex-ed" to include emotional intelligence and responsible decision-making lessons.

In Guatemala, Curamericas Global mobilized local communities to deploy health committees and mother-peer educatiors to bring health education to every doorstep. As a result, in our project catchment, maternal mortality decreased by 79%, from 4 deaths per year, a maternal mortality ratio (MMR) of 602, to only 1 maternal death in 2020, a MMR of 142. According to UNICEF, the first 28 days of life - the neonatal period - is the most vulnerable time for a child's survival. Our work has demonstrated that neonatal mortality rates were reduced from 43 deaths per 1,000 live births in 2017 to 16 in 2021, a 61% decrease! Or something like that.

The end of the RMHC Grant reflects
Curamericas Global's role as a catalyst for
significant, sustainable gains in the health
of mothers and children by empowering
communities to lead and transform failing local
health systems to functional ones.

Sustainability in action is when project expenses come from local sources. In 2020, about 2/3rds of all expenses came from local sources. In 2021, it was up to 85%. Community members, town governments, and state and federal health departments all chip in to cover the costs of healthcare, reducing dependency on outside dollars and ensuring programs continue.



## Guatemala



After a long, unprecedented year, the Casa Materna in Toquian Grande welcomed a healthy new baby to their community on Christmas Day.



18-year-old Nohemí lives in a community in the rolling hills of Northwest Guatemala. As a first-time mom, she wanted to provide herself and her unborn child with a healthy future. During her pregnancy, she attended prenatal care checks at the Casa Materna, receiving health education and medical tests that allowed the Casa Materna staff to manage health issues to ensure a safe delivery. She also worked with the team to create a birth plan and schedule upcoming visits. Nohemí gave birth at the Casa Materna to a healthy baby boy. She and her family expressed to the staff how fortunate they felt to give birth according to their Maya customs and with people they know and trust.

Yolotli began labor at 3 a.m. and made her way to the Calhuitz Casa Materna for delivery with her midwife. At first, everything seemed to be progressing normally and a healthy delivery was expected. After an ultrasound, the baby was found to be in a dangerous position. Thanks to the resources available at the Casa, Yolotli delivered a healthy baby boy, weighing 6 pounds, 8 ounces.







#### **Mom-A-Thon: Our Annual Fundraiser**

In our fifth year our annual Mom-A-Thon fundraiser to save the lives of moms and babies was a resounding success. Thanks to your contributions and generous matching challenges, nearly \$500,000 was raised in 2021. The participating teams were diverse - from high school students and young professionals to long-time supporters of Curamericas Global. Unable to meet in person, teams got creative, with their fundraising efforts, hosting Zoom trivia nights, Facebook fundraisers, and even virtual yoga!

Through these efforts in 2022 we will be able to continue to support our programs around the world and here in the U.S., digging in with our partners to save lives and prevent unnecessary suffering.

### The Young Professionals Board of Curamericas




